Mary Reynolds Wins Hambletonian Stake

Goshen, N. Y., Aug. 15.—Rain, the nemesis which has brought so much trouble to Grand Circuit meetings at Good Time Park, set in Sunday night and continued until well into yesterday, forcing a postponement of the opening. Today the weather was fair and a program of five races was disposed of with a crowd of about 2,500 out for the preliminary to the Hambletonian stake which is expected to attract a record breaking crowd to Good Time Park tomorrow.

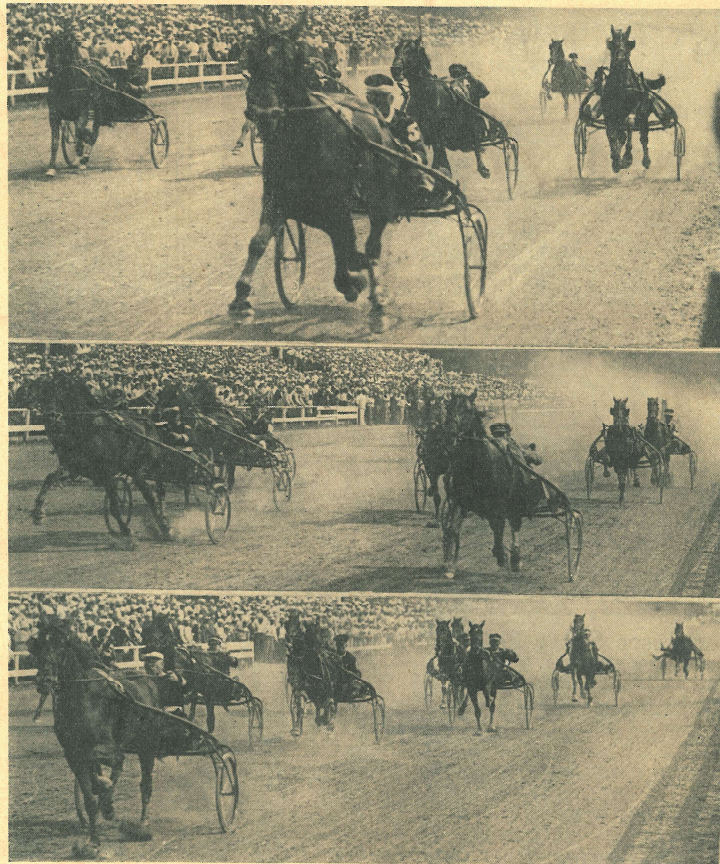
Kashmary was the particular bright star of the opening, the four-year-old filly from Peninsular Farms and driven by Ben White, accounting for first money in the second division of the Progressive trotting stake. She was the choice in the auctions, selling at \$50, Mac Hanover \$30, Full Trust \$15, Mi Peter \$10 and the field \$10. In each heat White kept her well up to the leaders at the getaway, took an early lead, and she just breezed home, the first heat in 2:02½, a new record for the filly.

General Hanover, Full Trust and Sir Walter Scott were pacemakers but when the speed was turned on Kashmary held them all safe and won without trouble. Mi Peter trotted a consistent race and landed second in the summary. Kashmary trotted the last half of the second heat in 59½ seconds, the last quarter in :28¾.

Tom Berry, starting Hanover Medium for the first time, won the Wedgemere for two-year-old pacers, the bay colt racing like a veteran campaigner and wearing down Laurel Hanover in the drives through the homestretch. The opening event was the Walnut Hall for three-year-olds and Calumet Daffy, the champion walkover winner, won in straight heats. She was easy in the first heat with Calumet Dawson breaking in the homestretch but in the final Dickerson's gelding had her beaten at the distance stand, then went to a break and it was over.

Hollyrood Spead \$25, Madelon \$20 and the field \$15 was the auction market on the fourth division of the Progressive trot. Iosola's McElwyn led to the wire in the first heat with Madelon attempting to come through at the rail but falling short. In the next two Gibson White brought the filly, owned by Will Strang Jr. and Ben White, around the outside and she won with the youthful reinsman sitting still.

The second division of the Goshen for pacers furnished another favorite winner in Lydia Knight, driven by Harry Stokes. She brought \$25 in pools of \$81. In the first heat she dropped back going into the first turn and Miss Volo came through to win in a drive from Peter Pottemkin. In the next two Stokes had the filly well up early each time, came through to win

without being brought to a drive, the final heat in 2:03½.
